- hang / hang up
- mess / mess up

I am only concerned with idiomatic up here

Ditransitive verbs

Ditransitive verbs V₃ have subject, direct object, and indirect object

"I give you the ball"

 $give_3(I, you, the ball)$

I will consider S V O IO to be 'basic' form, where IO is complement

1. When V is ditransitive, "V *up*" means V with an inferred direct object. The indirect object can also be inferred.

I give sb. sth. I give up sth. I give up.

2. In conversation, this is used to highlight the IO or S.

DO > IO > S

give up with implicit DO

- 1. his ghost moved up towards heaven
- 2. up as ellipsis of DO

give up (implicit DO, IO)

I give up = I give (to DO) (IO)

- Giving anything to anyone
- Consistent with defeat

Similarly:

They'll pay up = They'll pay (to DO) (the money)

```
I owe up = I owe (to DO) (my mistakes)
```
